

2021 IN REVIEW

Now in our Third year of grantmaking, we have grown the program in exciting ways!

In 2021, QMF granted \$93,000 to 21 organizations, eight of whom were first-time grant-seekers. We provided technical assistance in topics such as budgeting, strategic planning, website development, conflict management, and board and organizational structure. Technical assistance existed in the form of one-on-one coaching calls, individual workshops and resources, and cohort gatherings.

Our grantees have made amazing accomplishments, including opening the first queer wellness center in Greenville, SC; hosting programs in rural NC communities to engage and educate queer youth and their peers; and providing free and low-cost birth work to QTBIPOC in need. In the process, many grantees have gotten to pay their organizers for the first time for the important, taxing work of running a grassroots community project.

Looking towards 2022, we are excited to continue growing our technical assistance and capacity support for QTBIPOC-led grassroots efforts across the Southeast. This includes providing spaces for grantees to deepen their relationships with each other and growing our engagement with QMF alumni. We are excited to announce the opening of an additional \$10,000 grant, to be awarded to 5 organizations, with an intensified focus on capacity building, technical assistance, and grantee relationships.


